Do you love to have guests drop by? If the answer is yes, then let your friends and family know! These doormats will be a fun way to welcome guests this fall and dress up your doorstep at the same time. Choose any saying you like and maybe even make several mats to change out for each holiday!

WHAT YOU'LL NEED

- coir mat, 18" x 24" available for less than \$10 at many big-box stores
- outdoor acrylic paint
- "pumpkin" script letters found at bit.ly/HFPumpkin
- 8.5" x 11" paper
- large poster board
- permanent marker
- craft knife
- sponge stencil brush
- small watercolor paintbrush
- block letter stencils

WHAT YOU'LL DO

- Print the "pumpkin" script letters onto 2 sheets of 8.5" x 11" paper and cut them out.
- 2. Place cut letters onto the large poster board and trace around the type with a marker.
- 3. Using your craft knife, cut around the marker outlines. This poster board becomes your stencil for the word "pumpkin."
- 4. Lay your stencil on top of the coir doormat. Hold it firmly in the area you're painting.
- 5. Dip your sponge stencil brush in the acrylic paint and dab the paint in a straight up-down motion (not sweeping) to cover the area within your stencil.
- 6. Keep painting until you've fully covered your stencil design with paint.
- Remove the stencil from the mat and use the small watercolor paintbrush to fill in any areas of the design that didn't get fully covered with paint.

GET THE FAMILY TALKING

This fun game will be a great way to open dialogue with your children this fall and get to know them a little better. When applicable, have them expound on their answers, digging a little deeper into why they feel that way. The following prompts are just simple suggestions; encourage your family to come up with some of their own questions to get to know each other better! Remind your children that God knows every single detail about us—He knows our likes and our dislikes, and He loves us dearly!

WHAT YOU'LL NEED

- small pieces of paper, the same color and cut to the same size
- pens or pencils (all must be the same)
- bowl

WHAT YOU'LL DO

- 1. Place the bowl in the center of the table.
- 2. Give each person several small pieces of paper.
- 3. Pass out the pens or pencils. Each person needs to have the same writing utensil (all black/blue pens or all pencils so you can't tell the difference when everyone writes).
- 4. Using the If You Know, You Know prompts, read the questions one at a time and direct family members to write their answers. No one should see each other's answers.
- 5. Have them fold their papers and put them in the bowl.
- 6. After all answers are in the bowl, direct one person to read all the answers out loud.
- Start with the youngest and allow him to guess who gave each answer. Encourage family members not to give their answers away.
- 8. If the "guesser" did not get them all correct, pass the papers on to the next person and see if she can get all the answers correct.
- 9. Keep playing until someone finally guesses all the correct answers, and then move on to the next question.

WORSHIP

Known By MESSIAH

I wonder how many steps it was for her? Had she counted them each day as she made her way in the blazing Samaria sun to the place where she would draw water each time? Did her thoughts weigh as heavily on her mind as the jug she balanced on top of her head? Twelve more steps, nine more, only four to go ... finally, she could lay down her water jug and wipe the sweat dripping down her face. This wouldn't be so bad if only she could join the other women in the cool journey of the morning to draw water, but they didn't associate with her type. I wonder if she ever wanted to just tell them—"You don't know me!"

I wonder if that day was just like any other? Maybe she had a routine down pat. Did she hope to interact with anyone, or did she look forward to her time alone at the well? Regardless, she did have a visitor that day and small talk wasn't on the agenda. At first glance she had already labeled him ill prepared for obtaining water, stuck-up, and a Jew (which is important because Jews too did not associate with her type: Samaritan). But Jesus wasn't any of those things.

You see, anytime Jesus interrupts your rhythm in life, it is worth paying attention to. Check out John 4:1-15 for the interaction, but verse 16 is where we see the woman's secret(s) unfold.

> He told her, "Go, call your husband and come back." "I have no husband," she replied. Jesus said to her, "You are right when you say you have no husband. The fact is, you have had five husbands, and the man you now have is not your husband. What you have just said is quite true." (John 4:16-18)

At this point water was no longer the need, but she didn't run away for she knew she was having a conversation with someone who knew her. She knew all the skeletons in her closet meant those around her would never truly understand her, but this man was different. **He had love in His eyes and a tone of compassion in His voice.** He didn't air her dirty laundry for the world to judge, yet He confirmed that her secret was true and offered her a way out of sin by showing her where the true source of living water is found:

> The woman said, "I know that Messiah" (called Christ) "is coming. When he comes, he will explain everything to us." Then Jesus declared, "I, the one speaking to you—I am he." ... Then, leaving her water jar, the woman went back to the town and said to the people, "Come, see a man who told me everything I ever did. Could this be the Messiah?" (John 4:25-26, 28)

I wonder how long it had been since one of the men in her life had taken the time to sit and talk with her? Verse 29 tells us what her heart thought about the conversation with Jesus: "He knows me!" I'm not sure, but if her heart is anything like mine it probably burst at the second realization of "and He didn't shame me!"

Jesus saw the depth of this woman's heart and He loved her. He does the same for you and me. In a world where you can be in a crowd and still feel alone, He sees you; He knows you. He knows your heart and the buried secrets within. He tenderly calls each of us to reach down and bring those secrets to light so the light of the gospel can transform the dirtiest of secrets into new life for His glory.

Jesus knows you completely—and loves you. Leave your jug at the well and run to Him today.

READ TOGETHER JOHN 4:1-30.

Ask: How do you think the woman traveling to the well felt about having to go by herself everyday?

Possible answers: lonely, sad, afraid

Ask: When she arrived at the well, who does the Bible say was there sitting beside it?

Answer: Jesus

Say: The Bible tells us that Jesus cares for us (1 Peter 5:7). Isn't it great that Jesus cared enough to talk to the Samaritan woman when she was lonely?

WHAT YOU'LL NEED

- Bible
- white paper or cardstock
- watercolor paints (and glass of water for rinsing)
- paintbrushes
- white crayon

WHAT YOU'LL DO

Use the white crayon to draw or write something on a white piece of paper. Make sure to press down hard enough to leave wax on the paper. Then begin to paint strokes over the piece of paper with your watercolors. This will reveal your hidden message or drawing.

THEN, READ PSALM 139 TOGETHER.

Say: God knows everything about us! Even what is hidden in the depths of our hearts! Just like He told the woman at the well everything about her life, He knows yours too! Nothing is hidden from Him. He wants to reveal the things inside us that make us feel shame or sadness or loneliness so He can set us free. He wants to wash you with His living water and make a beautiful picture of your life.

Ask: Is there anything hidden in your life something you've done or maybe something that's happened to you—that makes God sad? Remember, He wants the best for you! (Psalm 38:18; 1 John 1:9).

Pray together, asking God to give you courage to reveal the hidden things in your lives. Thank Him for knowing you inside and out and loving you with an everlasting love!



My eight year old seems to be constantly throwing, catching, kicking, or hitting a ball, but he also craves his mom's hugs every night before bed and every morning before starting his day. PRAYER



Environments matter. Every space we enter communicates something, whether we're aware of it or

not. The right environment can encourage us to act or think a certain way. For example, when I worked in children's ministry, I wanted the rooms to communicate welcome and safety. I want my home to communicate warmth and retreat. I don't think I'm alone in my desire to create environments where people can thrive. In fact, Jesus models this very practice for us in the Bible.

In Luke 5 we read that the word about Jesus was spreading. People were coming from all over to seek Him out for healing and teaching. Then Luke 5:16 tells us, "But Jesus often withdrew to lonely places and prayed." Jesus cared about His prayer environment. He withdrew for prayer to a place where He could be alone and truly pour His heart out to His Father. We see the same thing in Matthew 14, where Jesus feeds the 5,000. After this incredible miracle, He sends everyone away, and we read in Matthew 14:23a that "after he had dismissed them, he went up on a mountainside by himself to pray." Here, Jesus uses a mountainside—a natural high place—as an environment where He can be alone. Jesus chose His environment carefully to create His own Prayer Place.

How about you? Do you have a place where you like to pray? Maybe it's a cozy chair facing a window or a seat at the kitchen table (not too comfortable so you aren't tempted to doze off?!) Maybe it's not a seat but a room–a space in your home that communicates warmth, safety, or connection to God.

This month decide as a family on a family Prayer Place. Walk around your home together and decide where would be a good place for people to "get away" to pray just like Jesus. Once you've picked the place, set out a journal or some paper in that spot. Throughout the month, encourage family members to get away to that spot to pray. They can grab the journal and jot down some of the things they want to talk to God about. Then, after each prayer, leave the journal there. When someone else feels the urge to get away, he can go to the spot and pray through the prayers that are already written or add his own to the journal.

Getting away to pray was important to Jesus, and He was deeply connected to God. We can adopt Jesus' practice, and it can help us know God better as well.



Have you ever wanted something so badly you couldn't think or talk about anything else? My daughter Shelby felt that way about getting a pet rabbit. She already had two cute little dwarf hamsters but wanted a dwarf Holland Lop bunny more than anything in the world!

To convince her mom and me that she was ready for this new responsibility, Shelby, who was eight years old, set out to become the resident Holland-Lop-bunny expert. She checked out a mountain of books from the library about bunny

training, feeding, breeding, and everything in between. She intently studied videos of how to trust-train your bunny, how to clip its toenails, and how to calm your bunny if it is scared. CREATE

BANDANA PUMPKINS

These adorable pumpkins are an easy family activity and will look great around your house this fall. After you make one of these pumpkins, ask your kids, "What is this?" They might look at you quizzically but stick with it. "It's a pumpkin!" Then, remind them that even though the pumpkin is covered in fabric we KNOW what it is—if you know you know! Share with them that when we know God, we can recognize Him even when we don't see or hear Him clearly. We can know God and recognize His character because we know Jesus.

WHAT YOU NEED

- small foam pumpkins
- bandanas or fabric
- brown craft paint
- Mod Podge
- foam brush
- scissors

WHAT YOU'LL DO

- Paint the stems of the pumpkins brown and let dry.
- Cut bandanas or fabric into 1 ¹/2" x 9" lengths. You can also rip the fabric pieces to give

the edges a rougher look. You will need approximately 14 fabric pieces to cover each foam pumpkin (depending on the size of the pumpkin).

- 3. Apply a thick layer of Mod Podge on the pumpkin with the foam brush.
- 4. Place fabric strips over Mod Podge, slightly overlapping each piece of fabric so the pumpkin doesn't show through. Tip: As you place the fabric on the pumpkin, pull it tight. This will keep it from bubbling up.
- 5. Cut off any ends of fabric that are too long.
- 6. Continuing adding strips around the entire pumpkin by overlapping each piece of fabric until the pumpkin is completely covered.
- 7. Allow to dry and display in your home.

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COUNTING My Candy Corn



REMEMBER!

This game requires a little bit of math. Now, some of us may be great at math, but some of us might struggle. Everyone has different strengths and things we know better than others. What I love so much about our God is that He knows us completely ALL. THE. TIME., but we can always seek to know Him more. God invites us to expand our knowledge of who He is simply by asking. He desires relationship with us, and so of course this is something He wants us to do! Does that mean everything is going to become perfectly clear to us? No, but that's okay! It's okay because we have such a big and amazing God we can spend our whole lives learning more about Him and He will never run out of ways to connect with us and reveal Himself to us. This month remind your kids that God invites all of us to know Him, and that is something to celebrate!

WHAT YOU'LL NEED

- number cards (1 per player) found at bit.ly/HFCountingCorn
- pair of dice
- candy corn
- bowl or jar

BEFORE YOU START

Pour the candy corn into a bowl or jar and place it, along with the dice, in the center of your game space. Set out a number card for each player.

TIME TO PLAY!

Invite your family over to the game space. Instruct each player to sit in front of a game card. Choose the oldest member of the group to go first.

This player will roll the dice in the center space (for example, she rolls a 3 and a 5) and add the two numbers together (for a solution of 8). She then must find the solution numbers (8s) on her game card and cover each with a candy corn. This player will then pass her dice to the person on her left who will take his turn. The first person to create a complete straight line (horizontal, vertical, diagonal) wins! You can even play to blackout, which is when the card is completely full. This is a fun game to play over and over—as long as the candy corn hasn't all been eaten!

As the evenings begin to cool, we all know nothing comforts like warm soup. Serve this hearty Autumn Wild Rice Soup with a loaf of your favorite crusty bread and a side salad for a delicious fall meal!

WHAT YOU'LL NEED

- 6 cups vegetable stock (or chicken stock)
- 1 cup uncooked wild rice
- 8 ounces baby bella mushrooms, sliced
- 4 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 medium carrots, diced
- 2 ribs celery, diced
- 1 large (about 1 pound) sweet potato, peeled and diced
- 1 small white onion, peeled and diced
- 1 bay leaf
- l ¹/₂ tablespoons Old Bay seasoning (or another seafood/poultry seasoning)
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 1/4 cup all-purpose flour
- l 1⁄2 cups milk
- 2 large handfuls of kale, roughly chopped with thick stems removed
- kosher salt and freshly cracked black pepper





WHAT YOU'LL DO

Slow Cooker Method

- Combine vegetable stock, wild rice, mushrooms, garlic, carrots, celery, sweet potato, onion, bay leaf, and Old Bay seasoning in the bowl of a large slow cooker. Stir briefly to combine.
- 2. Cook on high for 4 hours or on low for 8 hours until the rice is cooked and tender.
- 3. During the final 10 minutes of slow cooking, prepare cream sauce on the stove. In a medium saucepan, cook the butter over medium-high heat until melted. Whisk in the flour until combined and cook for 1 minute. Gradually whisk in the milk. Continue cooking, stirring frequently, until the mixture nearly comes to a simmer and has thickened. (It should be very thick.)
- Add the cream sauce and kale to the soup and stir gently until combined. Taste and season with salt and pepper as needed.
- 5. Serve warm or transfer to sealed container and refrigerate for up to 4 days.

Stovetop Method

- Heat (an extra) 1 tablespoon of butter in a large stockpot over medium-high heat.
- 2. Add onion and sauté for 5 minutes, stirring occasionally, until soft and translucent. Stir in the garlic and cook for an additional 1 to 2 minutes until fragrant.
- 3. Add the vegetable stock, wild rice, mushrooms, carrots, celery, sweet potato, bay leaf, and Old Bay seasoning. Stir to combine.
- 4. Continue cooking until the soup reaches a simmer. Then reduce heat to medium-low, cover, and simmer for 45 minutes or until rice is tender, stirring occasionally.
- 5. During the final 10 minutes, prepare your cream sauce in a separate saucepan on the stove. Melt the butter over medium-high heat until melted. Whisk in the flour until combined and cook for 1 minute. Gradually whisk in the milk. Continue cooking, stirring frequently, until the mixture nearly comes to a simmer and has thickened. (It should be very thick.)
- 6. Add the cream sauce and kale to the soup and stir gently until combined. Taste and season with salt and pepper as needed.
- 7. Serve warm or transfer to sealed container and refrigerate for up to 4 days.

KIDS IN THE KITCHEN

PUMPKIN ROLL

PREP: 30 min. COOK: 15 min. YIELDS: 8-10 servings

WHAT YOU'LL NEED

Cake

- ³/₄ cup all-purpose flour, plus extra for dusting baking sheet
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- ¹/4 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1/4 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 3 large eggs
- l cup granulated sugar
- ²/₃ cup canned pumpkin (not pumpkin pie filling)
- 1/4 cup powdered sugar (to sprinkle on the towel

Filling

- 8 ounces cream cheese, softened
- 1 cup powdered sugar, sifted
- 6 tablespoons butter, softened
- 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract
- powdered sugar for garnish

WHAT YOU'LL DO

Cake

- 1. Preheat oven to 375° F.
- 2. Spray a 15" x 10" baking sheet (jelly roll pan) with nonstick cooking spray. Line with a fitted piece of parchment paper and spray the parchment. Generously dust the baking sheet with flour and tap out the excess.
- 3. In a medium-sized mixing bowl, combine flour, baking powder, baking soda, cinnamon, cloves, ginger, and salt.
- 4. In the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with the paddle attachment, combine the eggs and granulated sugar and beat on medium until thick. Pour in the pumpkin puree and blend on medium until combined.
- 5. Add the flour mixture and continue to blend on low until well combined.
- 6. Using a spatula, spread the pumpkin mixture evenly onto the prepared jelly roll pan.
- 7. Bake for 13 to 15 minutes or until the top of the cake springs back when gently pressed with a finger.

WHAT YOU'LL DO

Filling

- While the cake is baking, make the cream cheese filling. In a large mixing bowl combine the cream cheese, remaining powdered sugar, butter, and vanilla.
- 2. Use an electric handheld mixer to beat the ingredients until they are creamy and smooth.

Assembly

- Lay a thin kitchen towel flat on a clean surface. Sprinkle the towel with powdered sugar.
- 2. Immediately loosen the cake from the baking sheet and turn it out onto the prepared kitchen towel.
- Carefully peel the paper from the cake. Carefully roll up the cake and towel together, starting with narrow end. Cool the cake on a wire rack.
- 4. Carefully unroll cake, keeping the towel underneath the cake.
- 5. Allow your children to evenly spread the cream cheese filling over the cake all the way to the edges.
- 6. Gently roll the cake, taking care to not press the filling out of the ends.
- 7. Wrap the cake in plastic wrap and refrigerate for at least 1 hour.
- 8. Sprinkle the cake with additional powdered sugar before serving, if desired.
- 9. Slice and serve.

FAMILY TIME

Knowing God

As 21st century Christians, we can easily take for granted the idea that to know Jesus is to know God. Of course, Jesus is God. If we want to know what God is like, we can just look at Jesus. This is almost commonplace to us.

However, in Jesus' day, this idea would have been absolutely crazy, and even blasphemous! To a good first-century Jew, there was only one God. Believing in and following the one true God, Yahweh, is what set Jews apart from the pagan cultures around them that worshipped lots of different deities. So when Jesus came on the scene and started making claims like "If you really know Me, you will know My Father as well" and "Anyone who has seen Me has seen the Father," He would've angered a lot of people!

It was bad enough that Jesus was calling Yahweh His father. Yahweh was seen generally as the father of the nation of Israel, but individual Jews did not consider Yahweh their father—that was much too intimate and personal. But Jesus was not only calling God His Father; He was actually equating Himself *with* God.

It's only in light of Jesus' death and resurrection that we can see His claims about Himself as indeed valid. Through His resurrection, Jesus proved that He wasn't just blowing smoke. He really is God. And now, through studying all of Jesus' words and actions recorded in Scripture, we really can know exactly what God is like.

HEAR IT

Read John 14:1-10 as a family in a translation that's easy to understand. Focus especially on verses 7-10. Then, discuss the following questions.

- What does Jesus mean when He says if someone has seen Him, they've seen the Father?
- 2. What are some things we can know about God's character by looking at Jesus' life? Give specific examples. (For instance, God must be

both powerful and compassionate. We can know this because Jesus healed a lot of people from diseases, showing that He had compassion for people who were hurting and also had the power to heal them.)

DO IT

Using our template found at bit.ly/HFKnowCard, create a short bio (kind of like you might see on a baseball card) of some of the things you know about Jesus.

First, draw a picture of what Jesus might have looked like. (Remember, He would've been a typical first-century Jewish man, which means He almost certainly had dark skin, short, brown curly hair, brown eyes and a scruffy beard and was probably around five feet tall! Oh, and because of the limited dental care available at the time, He was very likely missing some teeth!)

Then, fill in the following stats (looking up the verses below if you need help). Feel free to add your own categories as well (hobbies, character traits, miracles, famous quotes, etc.).

- Hometown (Matthew 2:23; 21:11)
- Family members (Matthew 1:16; Mark 6:3)
- Occupation (Mark 6:3)
- Best friends (Matthew 17:1)

Keep your cards and refer to them when you want to remember or share with others what we know to be true about God from looking at the life of Jesus!

A BLESSING CAN BE A PRAYER OF COMMISSION, A BIBLE PASSAGE, OR WORDS OF ENCOURAGEMENT. BLESSINGS CAN BE SPOKEN OVER A CHILD FOR THE PURPOSE OF DECLARING GOD'S PROTECTION, JOY, AND WISDOM OVER HIM.

"God is good all the time, and all the time God is good!" I heard this phrase often while growing up and, honestly, I really struggled with it. If God is good, why do we see so much evil in the world and experience such heartache? This can be one of the hardest things to explain to our kids, especially when we may not feel confident in the answer ourselves. It's almost as if those who say this "God is good" phrase are in on some big secret while the rest of us sit on the outside, desperate to be let in.

But what if I could know God? Not just a bunch of facts about Him but truly know Him on a deep, personal level. It is that type of knowing Luke 11:9 invites me into. But how do I go about it? 
Because we can dwell differently.

WHERE IN THE WORLD IS ...

NAURU

Nauru is a tiny island in the Pacific Ocean located just south of the equator and northeast of New Guinea and the Solomon Islands. Nauru is only 8.1 square miles in size, making it one of the smallest nations in the world. As an island country, Nauru has no land borders with other countries. It is roughly circular in shape and has about 18 miles of coastline.

There are over 10,000 people who call Nauru their home.



If you lived in Nauru you most likely would worship in a Christian Congregational church. Religion: Nauruan Congregational Church 36%, Roman Catholic 33%, Assemblies of God 13%, Nauruan Indigenous Religion 10%



If you lived in Nauru you would speak Nauruan. To say, "Hello" in Nauruan, you would say, "Ekamowir omo" (pronounced E-kamou-I-r-omo).

DID YOU KNOW?

- Nauru has no cities, and its population lives in small settlements along the coast.
- Nauru is also known as Pleasant Island.
- Nauru tops the list of the least-known countries in the world.

If you lived in Nauru you might eat a lot of imported canned food. Cultivation is difficult on Nauru due to the poor soil, irregular rainfall, and the impact of mining. There is no local fruit or vegetables. Fresh food is limited to a small amount of fish and, very occasionally, beef.

Six Countries You Have Never Heard Of

- 1. NAURU Apparently only 200 tourists visited Nauru in 2011, even though its coral reefs are loaded with exotic snorkeling spots. The island has space for only two hotels.
- **2. KYRGYZSTAN** This Asian country is trapped between mountain ranges, so horseback riding is a common means of transportation.
- BRUNEI Nobody pays taxes in this little mosque-covered nation on the island of Borneo.

- 4. **KIRIBATI** If you clumped together all 33 of Kiribati's teensy islands, they'd be about the size of New York City. But the teensy islands are so spread out in the Pacific Ocean that it takes six hours to fly from the first one to the last.
- 5. DJIBOUTI This desert country's major landmark is Lake Assal, the third-lowest point on earth. The lake is hot and salty; temperatures around it are scorching. Fresh water is so scarce that people accept bottled water as payment.
- 6. MALTA This little island off the coast of Sicily belonged to Phoenecians, Romans, Arabs, and Napoleon before winning independence in the 1960s. It's known as the original homeland of both the dwarf hippo and the Maltese dog. Its temple complexes are also some of the oldest freestanding structures known to man.

After the group laughed a bit, she profoundly stated, profound truth; however, I was reminded that God was speaking because He wanted this girl to know that He took time on her and knows all about her because of that. This middle school-aged girl left that weekend confident that God cared about her as His sheep and knowing that she was

I'm not proud of it, but I am a loud talker. I have tried to "keep it down" and it works—for a bit. But inevitably, the volume of my voice will increase, and I will be the loudest one in the room. My wife and I worked at the same church for a while, and she always knew when I was in the office—from across the office. Probably the worst is when I can be located in crowded places like malls and airports based on my conversations and boisterous words. I guess it's not the worst thing in the world. My family and friends can always find me. I just get a little embarrassed when people know I am in the area and I am nowhere to be seen, just heard. For my family specifically, they always say that they *know* it's me when they *hear* my voice.

That is ultimately what we want for our kids in their relationship with their heavenly Father. As they grow into young adults, we want them to mature in their faith so that they can:

- hear and know God's voice,
- desire to obey it,
- obey it in the power of God's Spirit (not their own strength).

KNOWING God's voice. What a gift! Not like a piercing voice that is too loud at a hospital (sorry, that was me) but being able to clearly hear from God, know what He wants from us, and live changed lives through the work of the Holy Spirit. We then become a reflection of His character and nature. Other people may have different experiences than I do. Their ears may be more in tune with the Holy Spirit speaking to them. But for me, this is a skill that takes time and gets easier the more I do it. It shouldn't be a surprise though. The more time I spend with someone, the more I *know* about him. Even though I was fairly certain this wasn't about chicken, I still could not wait to get home and grab a quiet minute to figure it out. All day long I was so bothered! To me, it felt like, in the course of one ordinary day, I went from believing I knew all of my best friend's ins and outs to feeling



TRUSTING ABBA FATHER


was spiritually stuck. As a Christian since childhood, a 29-year children's pastor, a pastor's wife, and a Bible college graduate, I knew a lot *about* God and the Bible. And, of course, I wanted everyone's identity to be rooted in Christ and His love!

What rocked my world was discovering, in a two-year spiritual formation group, that I didn't really know God the way our Abba Father longs for us to know Him. Childhood wounding blocked the love Jesus wanted to lavish upon me. When I heard that I was beloved, valued, and worthy, my super-powered protective barrier went up and all of those truths ricocheted off, never penetrating my soul.

Buried childhood wounds began to surface. How could I experience God's amazing love when I had been unseen, unprotected, and wounded? Diving deeper, I realized had shoved down memories to protect myself, but I was often still responding as that hurt little girl. With Jesus' help I began to demolish the barrier. In order to experience God's love, I had to not only love myself but take care of the wounded child within. By dwelling on the truths of God's love for me while recalling painful childhood events, I began to heal. He loved this wounded little girl; I needed to love her too. **The child within was asking in a soft, childlike voice: "Jesus, do You REALLY love ME? … Me?"**

I encourage you to read the "story" below to the child within you—"little (your name)." Before reading, recall times as a child when you were weak and vulnerable. Listen as that child, and ask yourself, "What am I feeling?" Reflect upon: "Is this how 'little me' sees herself/himself?" Could these words, which you may easily embrace as an adult, not be reaching all of you? Often the child within needs to hear them most.

Did you know that long before you were born, our big God knew you? Yes, our big God knew everything



about YOU! What color eyes and hair you would have, whether you would be interested in dance, sports, science, art, or reading—and it brings Him great joy! Our big God knew you would be outgoing, quiet, or somewhere in-between.

He delights in your uniqueness and loves everything about you—His precious creation.

Our big God looks at YOU, His child, as a perfect loving parent would–with total love! When He looks at you our big God shouts: "YOU are precious! YOU are unique! YOU are loved!" His love for you is HUGE!

Our big God hears you. He's longing for you to share your daily experiences with Him, both happy and sad. Just like your best friend, He wants to hear what's on your heart. He wants to talk to you, too.

Our big God has a journey just for you. Once you embrace how deep and wide His love is for you, He is ready to take your hand and guide you in this amazing adventure He has for YOU. Speak What You Know

"You're mean!"

With three young daughters sharing tight quarters in our home, those two words bounce down the hallways far more often than I would like to admit. So, my husband and I recently banned the phrase and replaced it with an important reminder: "A single unkind action does not make your sister an unkind person. You must speak only what you know to be true."

The reminder is a tough but important one, and we soon realized how much our marriage could benefit from the same kind of verbal overhaul. Too often the heat of conflict can inject our conversations with such inflammatory words as "always" and "never"—words that convey our frustrations but certainly not the truth.

These infractions may seem trivial, or at least run of the mill when it comes to marriage, but if we are committed to creating a home environment where the inhabitants desire to know God's truth, we must take captive every threat of dishonesty that would creep inside our borders—even those that are unintended or perhaps even socially acceptable.

Think about it for a minute. How many popular sitcoms can you name that employ marital conflict as comedic relief? Arguments between spouses are backed by a laugh track, even when the words being volleyed back and forth are exaggerated, untruthful, and downright hurtful. Often the storyline is propelled even further when the husband and wife berate and criticize each other to their friends.

The sad reality is, popular culture doesn't care whether or not our marriages succeed, let alone whether or not they glorify God. But if we desire these outcomes, we must train ourselves to speak only what we know, no matter how fiercely our emotions try to influence us.

What does this look like on a practical level? For starters, sit down with your spouse and identify those areas where you are prone to drift from absolute truth and then practice keeping a steady course. For example, I tend to view circumstances disproportionately when I am feeling stressed or overwhelmed (e.g., "You always forget about this" or "You never consider my feelings"). I have to practice alternate phrases such as "When you do this, it makes me feel ..." so that my responses under stress will be only those that I know to be true. On the other hand, my husband hates conflict, so he tends to acquiesce for the sake of peace. He'll mutter, "You're right," even when we both know he doesn't truly feel that way. Once we identified these areas of weakness (and ultimately, dishonesty), we were able to adjust our responses accordingly.


On the flip side, consider what encouraging truths your spouse needs to hear and commit to speaking them regularly-regardless of your feelings. "I love you," "I'm proud of you," and "You are a blessing to me" are words we should aim to speak daily, not just when our emotions line up.

As Proverbs 18:21 says, "The tongue has the power of life and death." The battle for absolutely honesty-even in the midst of conflict-is one that must be fought tirelessly. But let us not grow weary! For speaking what we know rather than what we feel is a powerful practice that will impact not only our marriages but also our entire families.

And that's the truth.

Truth. In this day and age, our grandchildren are often taught that truth is subjective; each person decides for himself what his own "truth" is and then no other person should question it. Far too often this "truth" comes with a high price-lives are destroyed and people end up in bondage to their "truth."

We know the Bible teaches us that Jesus is the way, the truth, and the life (John 14:6). We can know the truth, and it will make us free (John 8:32). Jesus wants us to know the truth so we will have the freedom and life found in Him. One of the most important things we will ever do as grandparents is teach and model an absolute trust and belief in Jesus. This is done by the words we speak and the lives we live. We even influence our grown children as well as our grandchildren when they see that truth matters to us.

Throughout the coming school year our grandchildren will learn many things—some that are true and some that aren't. While we're not able to stop them from hearing false things at school or from friends, we are able to teach and model the truth to them and encourage them to turn to Jesus whenever they wonder what the truth is (Luke 11:9).

Consider giving your grandchildren sticky notepads to write down their prayer requests and then place the notes where they'll see them-next to their beds, on the bathroom mirrors, inside their lockers or notebooks. When they see the requests, tell them to talk with God about those requests. As God answers, suggest they write what He did to answer and then save the notes as reminders of God's care. Teach and model the truth-do not give up. When difficult and sad times come-and they will-continue to teach and model a life grounded in the truth. When people you love turn from a life of faith-and this may happen-do not give up. When the world around you and the ones you love become even more contrary to the truth-and they will-do not give up. When you persevere, you will leave the ones you love a great gift that has the ability to impact generations.

Responsibility

This environment captures the ability to take ownership for one's life, gifts, and resources before God. A child must be challenged to take responsibility for his or her brothers and sisters in Christ, as well as for those who are spiritually lost. Our hope is that the Holy Spirit will use this environment to allow each child to understand that God has entrusted His world to us.

Out of the Comfort Zone

As children and students are challenged to step out of their comfort zone from an early age, they learn to experience a dependence on the Holy Spirit to equip and strengthen them beyond their natural abilities and desires. We believe this environment will cultivate a generation that, instead of seeking comfort, seeks a radical life of faith in Christ.

"Asks the question, "What needs to be done?"

Serving

This posture of the heart asks the question, "What needs to be done?" It allows the Holy Spirit to cultivate a sensitivity to others and focuses on a cause bigger than one individual life. It helps fulfill the mandate that as Christ-followers we are to view our lives as living sacrifices that we generously give away!

Love & Respect

Without love, our faith becomes futile. This environment recognizes that children need an environment of love and respect in order to be free to both receive and give God's grace. Innate to this environment is the value that children are respected because they embody the image of God. We must speak to them, not at them, and we must commit to an environment where love and acceptance are never withheld due to one's behavior.

Storytelling

The power of The Big God Story impacts our lives by giving us an accurate and awe-inspiring perspective into how God has been moving throughout history. It is the story of redemption, salvation, and hope and tells how I have been grafted into it by grace. It further compels us to see how God is using every person's life and is creating a unique story that deserves to be told for God's glory.

Knowing

Nothing could be more important than knowing and being known by God. We live in a world that denies absolute truth, and yet God's Word offers just that. As we create an environment that upholds and displays God's truth, we give children a foundation based on knowing God, knowing His Word, and a relationship with Him through Christ. God is holy, mighty, and awesome, and yet He has chosen to make Himself known to us!

Identity

This environment highlights who we are in Christ. According to Ephesians 1, we have been chosen, adopted, redeemed, sealed, and given an inheritance in Christ ... all of which we did nothing to earn. This conviction allows children to stand firm against the destructive counter-identities the world will offer.

Course Correction

This environment flows out of Hebrews 12:11-13 and is the direct opposite of punishment. Instead, biblical discipline for a child encompasses a season of pain, the building up in love, and a vision of a corrected path for the individual with the purpose of healing at its core.
